Friday, July 20, 2012 First Day of Ramadan (Islam/Muslim)	Beginning of Ramadan	Celebrated with special evening prayers at the Mosque. Also, one would prepare a special meal eaten just before sunrise to help toward the upcoming fast. Those who travel to a mosque for prayer would be away from campus most of July 20 th and part of July 21 st .
Friday, July 20, 2012 - Sunday, August 19, 2012 Ramadan (Islam/Muslim)	A month of fasting	For the entire month of Ramadan (sundown July 20 th - sundown August 19 th), Muslims fast – abstain from food and drink – from sunrise to sunset. The last 10 days include all night prayer vigils in some traditions. Those observing Ramadan can still attend classes.
Sunday, August 19, 2012 Eid al-Fitr (Muslim)	The Last Day of Ramadan	A celebratory meal takes place on the evening of August 19 th . Also, many would travel to the mosque on August 20 th for early morning prayers. Those traveling to a mosque for prayer would be away from campus the entire day of August 20 th .
Sunday, September 16, 2012 Erev Rosh Hashanah (Jewish)	Eve of the Jewish New Year	At sundown on September 16 th , all labor – school, work, travel – is ceased.
Monday, September 17, 2012 - Tuesday, September 18, 2012 Rosh Hashanah (Jewish)	The Jewish New Year	One of the holiest days of the year on which labor is prohibited. It is regarded as a time to begin introspection, acknowledge the mistakes of the past year and plan the changes to make in the new year. A service is held on the evening of September 16 th , and in the morning and afternoon of September 17 th . Those traveling to a synagogue or home for this holiday will have to arrive before sundown on September 16 th – the time when all labor must cease – and since the holiday ends at sundown on the 18 th , would be away from campus until September 19 th .
Tuesday, September 25, 2012 Kol Nidre (Jewish)	Eve of Day of Atonement	The Day of Atonement, the end of the 10 Days of Awe, is devoted to prayer, repentance and fasting. The Sabbath of Sabbaths in the Jewish calendar, it is the most widely observed Jewish holiday of the year.
Wednesday, September 26, 2012 Yom Kippur (Jewish)	Day of Atonement	At sundown on September 25 th , a full fast – no water or food – begins and lasts for 25 hours. At this time, all labor – school, work, travel – ceases. Those traveling to a synagogue or home must arrive by sundown on September 25 th , so would be away from campus September 25 th -26 th .
Monday, October 1, 2012 - Sunday, October 7, 2012 Sukkot (Jewish)	The Feast of Tabernacles	Commemorates the years that the Jews spent in the desert on their way to the Promised Land, and celebrates the way in which God took special care of them under impossible conditions. Sukkot lasts for seven days, and work is not permitted on the first two days.
